The seminars aim to critically analyse the rules of international and European Union law underlying the protection of animal welfare in light of the emerging contemporary paradigm whereby animals would themselves become right-holders. This moral and normative evolution would thus see the emergence of supra-national approaches to animal rights rather than the traditional anthropocentric considerations that permeate the traditional normative decision-making system. The seminars therefore aim to address developments at the international level by focusing on some key economic sectors that currently see animals as economic factors rather than rights-holders.
